Intended Learning Outcomes (ILO)

On completion of the course the students will be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- demonstrate knowledge of the characteristics of family enterprises as compared to other type of business organizations
- demonstrate knowledge of the main challenges and opportunities with regard to managing and governing a family enterprise
- demonstrate basic knowledge of the main theories used in family business research

Skills and abilities

- to conduct a basic analysis of the main advantage and disadvantages of a family business
- demonstrate basic skills to effectively work with or in a family enterprise, either as manager, advisor or owner

Judgement and approach

- adapt abilities to critically assess and evaluate a family business's advantages and disadvantage
- adapt abilities to critically apply main theories from family business research to practical cases of family enterprises

Contents

The course contains models and concepts in from classic as well as contemborary family business research and practice. A general introduction and overview of the characteristics of family businesses, as compared to other type of business organizations, is followed by an analysis of specific challenges facing family businesses in different stakeholder and cultural environments.

Type of instruction

Lectures, case seminars, special topic seminars, company visits, guest lectures.

The teaching is conducted in English.

Prerequisites

Bachelor degree equal to 180 ECTS credits. Fluency in English equivalent to at least 575 (paper based), 90 (internet based) TOEFL score (eller motsvarande).

Examination and grades

The course is graded A, B, C, D, E, FX or F.

The Knowledge and understanding, and judgment and approach is examined by an individual examination (worth 60% of the total grade) and a written review and presentation of an academic article (15%)

Skills and abilities is examined by the individual examination, as well as by active preparation and participation in case and special topic seminars (25%)

Course evaluation

It is the responsibility of the examiner to ensure that each course is evaluated. At the outset of the course, evaluators must be identified (elected) among the students. The course evaluation is carried out continuously as well as at the end of the course. On the completion of the course the course evaluators and course examiner discuss the course evaluation and possible improvements. A summary report is created and archived. The reports are followed up by program directors and discussed in program groups and with relevant others (depending on issue e.g. Associate Dean of Education, Associate Dean of faculty, Director of PhD Candidates, Dean and Director of Studies). The next time the course runs, students should be informed of any measures taken to improve the course based on the previous course evaluation.

Other information

This course overlaps with Creating a new venture, Introduction to Business Creation and Family Business Development.

Academic integrity
